FOUNDER



Olumawu was established in Abuja in January 1993, eight years after the parent school at Ilorin was founded by a renowned educationist Chief Mrs. Margaret Oloruntomiwo Audu of blessed memory.

Chief Mrs. Margaret Oloruntomiwo Audu PGDE (Queen Elizabeth College, London) M.Sc. (Child Development, Wisconsin)

Chief Mrs. Margaret Audu was of royal ancestry, daughter of Olumawu and grandchild of His Royal Majesty Oba Gbayero Ajibohokun, Obaro of Kabba (1870-1923).

The school is dedicated to the memory of the life and times of Princess Olumawu. Abuja of 1993 was practically without schools and for a long while, Olumawu was pratically the only school in the city. Hitting the ground running, with superlative performance of her pupils in the national common entrance examinations and the inspiring co-curricular activities the school soon acquired a solid reputation for academic excellence, rounded education and strong discipline.

The school has continued to grow and flourish. Following the introduction of the Universal Basic Education Programme, the school extended its provision to include Junior Secondary students, admitting the first cohort in September 2006.

The dream to extend the educational provision

further and establish a Senior Secondary School was realized on September 14th 2009 when Olumawu College opened its doors for the first time and welcomed students progressing from JSS3 as well as students new to the school.

Basic Education School Early Years

Students age 3 Months - 5 years old in Year groups from creche to nursery 2 belong to this section.

Our first objective is to ensure that each child settles into his or her new environment and come to know their teacher and socialise with their peers. It is equally important that they feel confident and happy, because once they do, it will not take them long to progress rapidly.

Each child will find days filled with with new experience which will develop them academically, socially, spiritually, and emotionally using gifts and talents, abilities and skills – social, scientific, artistic, sporting and musical – to become leaders and to be aware of their role as global citizens.

We firmly believe that for this success to happen, the parents must feature in the partnership; an important factor is the need to communicate. Parents of young children need to know, for example, what is happening from the homework. Early Years and Primary parents have daily direct access to the teacher either for a quick chat or to





make an appointment for a longer discussion. The Homework Diary also provides for a written note from or to the parent. A weekly Update, published on a Friday, reports what has happened that week and advertise future events.



Early Years

Similarly the update reports on major events across all three phases of the school. Parents consult formally with teachers about attainment and progress at the end of the term, after they have received written reports and at the end of the year.

The Primary Management Group, comprising of the Head of Primary and Key Stage Coordinators, oversee the educational provision and the quality of teaching and learning. They are also available to discuss matters of concern with parents.

Basic Education School



Curriculum - Lower Basic (Primary 1-3)

In the Lower Primary phase, emphasis is placed on further developing pupils' language and reading ability and number handling skills. Pupils are also introduced to a range of other subjects which continue to awaken their curiosity and eagerness to learn.

Curriculum - Upper Basic Education (Primary 4 - 6)

We aim to provide a curriculum sufficiently broad to ensure that each student has the opportunity to identify his/her own interests and strengths and to keep his/her options open for as long as possible.

In JSS1 and JSS2 students study a full range of academic subjects, fifteen subjects in total, all taught by specialist teachers.

In JSS3 students will study a minimum of thirteen subjects leading to their Basic Education Certificate Examination (BECE). The timetable are made up of what are known as the compulsory subjects' and 'electives'. Saturday Lessons take place for students from 9.00a.m. until 1.00p.m. All students are encouraged to attend, especially in JSS3.

Assessment

This is based on class work both written and oral, practical projects, homework, research, practical work and relevant to the subject, regular tests (CATs) and terminal examinations.

To be promoted to the next class a pupil would normally be expected to have obtained the set pass mark in the combined assessment of their performance in the exams and tests.

Facilities

Our facilities include:

• Spacious classrooms

• Well-equipped laboratories for Basic Technology, Basic Science, Home Economics, Information Technology, Art, Music and Languages.

• A well-stocked library with a range of learning resources, managed by an experienced librarian.

• Computer Laboratories equipped with networked, multimedia-capable and internet ready workstations.

• A small typing pool to enable Business Studies students to successfully fulfill the requirements of the BECE (Basic Education Certificate Examination) course.

• A mini school farm enabling the pupils/students to grow their own vegetables and produce broiler chickens and rabbits.

Excursions and Visits

Excursions are regularly organized to further develop the skills and knowledge of the pupils/students and support their understanding of the curriculum and to ensure that they are aware of contemporary issues.

Examples of our routine visits are the Senate, the High Court, Local farms, Ushafa Pottery etc. The school also regularly attends and participates in events organized by Governmental and Non Governmental Organizations.

School Hours

School hours are from 7.45a.m. to 3.00p.m. Monday to Thursday and 7.30a.m. to 1.00p.m. on Friday.

Post School classes take place from 3.00p.m. to 4.00p.m. based on need, for example Mathematics clinics.





Admissions

Admission is open to all classes subject of course to availability of space as the maximum population per class is limited to 15 pupils in Pre-School, 20 pupils in the primary section and 24 students in the Secondary.

Application forms are available from the school office and a placement test is normally conducted to ensure that the child is able to cope with the class for which admission is sought for lower and middle basic school.

An entrance examination is conducted trice in the year, in February, March and June for pupils wishing to enter JSS1 from other schools and Primary 5 pupils from Olumawu School.

Primary 5 pupils wishing to proceed to JSS1 must be 11 years old by March in the academic year of admission. The progression of our primary six pupils to JSS1 is automatic.

Curriculum

The curriculum takes account of the National Policy on Education and offers students the opportunity to specialize in the Science, Art or commercial field. Each student will follow the core curriculum and then select additional subjects based on his/her area of specialization.

Students will be prepared for the West African Senior School certificate Examination (WASSCE) and the National Examination Council Examination (NECO) both of which are administered in SS3.



Excursions and Visits

Excursions are regularly organized to further develop the skills and knowledge of the students and support their understanding of the curriculum and to ensure that they are aware of contemporary issues. Examples of usual study destinations are Kainji Dam, the Lokoja area, Yankari Game Reserve and Obudu Cattle Ranch.



College Hours

College hours are from 7.45a.m. to 3.00p.m. Monday to Thursday and 7.30a.m. to 1.00p.m. on Friday.

Students are encouraged to attend Saturday school from 9.00a.m. to 1.00p.m.

Post School classes take place between 3.00p.m. and 5.00p.m in preparation for WASSCE and UTME.



The College

The College now offers the Cambridge IGCSE programme (International General Certificate of Secondary Education). As the Cambridge IGCSE is compatible with other curricula, internationally relevant and sensitive to different needs and cultures, the courses are offered alongside the Nigerian Curriculum meaning that students will be prepared for WASSCE, NECO and IGCSE.



Admission

A placement test is conducted to assess the academic ability of the student and to assist in the choice of the area of specialization. The placement tests are organized at a mutually convenient time.

An entrance examination is conducted at the same time as that for JSS1 in March/June each year for students wishing to enter SS1 and SS2 from other schools.

For our JSS3 students wishing to transfer to the College, progression is automatic, subject to their performance in their terminal examinations and passing the BECE.

General Information

Rules, Regulations and Discipline

It is a condition of acceptance of the offer of place in the school to abide by all rules and regulations.

High standards of behavior are expected at all times and pupils/students are expected to follow the Code of conduct for their section of the school.

The school reverses the right to administer disciplinary action in the event of any infringement of the school rules and regulations. This may include the use of corporal punishment and where it is deemed appropriate by the school authorities the student may be suspended or expelled as the xase may be from the school. Parent/Guardians will be informed and involved as appropriate.





General Information

Refreshments

Pupils and students are allowed to bring their refreshments to school. A pastry tuck shop operated by the school provides light meals, snacks and drinks.

Purchases from the tuck shop are made using an ATM card, issued in the Accounts Office. A 'point of Sale' (P.O.S) is installed at the tuck shop for purchases using the card.

Clubs and Societies

The school provides facilities for and supports a variety of clubs and societies to enrich school life and promote the development of latent skills and talents. The range of clubs and societies includes Press/Drama, Okun Club, Music and Choral Group, French, Rhymes, JETS, Health and Environment, Guides/Brownies, Clubs/Scouts, Child Rights Brigade, Red Cross Society, Young Farmers' Club, Cultural Club, Home Makers and Chess Club.





School House System

All Pre School, Primary and Secondary students and staff are allocated to a House. The House system comprises four Houses:



Each House has an associated colour, on view each Wednesday when pupils and staff wear their House shirts. Many school activities are House related, covering a wide and varied spectrum of interests in the Arts, Sports, Academic and Community Service fields. By assisting with House and School events, students provide service to both the House and School. Students in each House are encouraged to be charitable in a number of ways, from fund-raising charity days to more hands on activities such as working with disadvantaged children.

The House System is based on the principle of teamwork, with each competition being the result of the skills and efforts of the House Team. Leadership is at the heart of the House System, with students being both servant leaders, as well as being able to hold a range of positions with specific responsibilities; House Captains and Deputies, Sports Captains, Form Representatives and Prefects for example. The House System is designed to provide opportunities that challenge each student in the House through the array of competitions, the range of events and the dynamics of the House community.

Many Pastoral events also take place over the year and



the results of these culminate in the awarding of the Pastoral Students of the Year which are presented on Speech Day. Here, the whole House joins together to sing as one in a culmination of community in unity and harmony to celebrate another rich and varied school year.























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
